History of Wrenshall

The City of Wrenshall was incorporated as a village in 1926. It was named after Charles Christopher Wrenshall, a Northern Pacific engineer. In the late 1800s, Wrenshall supervised building the railroad branch line from Carlton, Minnesota to Superior, Wisconsin. As was customary at the time the Northern Pacific named one of the new depot locations along this line in his honor.

The City of Wrenshall was actually started by Frederick Jacob Habegger and his family of nine children. Habegger was born on December 3, 1836. He was born in Switzerland and immigrated to America with his parents and eleven brothers and sisters in 1853. Habegger learned the brick making trade while living in LaCrosse, Wisconsin. The promise of good clay brought him north. In 1887 Habegger bought 160 acres of land where Wrenshall is now located.

A brickyard was started and soon Habegger's bricks were in great demand. He expanded his business over the next 20 years shipping bricks all over the United States. At its peak the brickyard produced approximately four million bricks/year and employed 35 men. A number of buildings in the city including the First Presbyterian Church and the Brickyard Restaurant are made from bricks from this first brickyard. At its peak there were six brickyards operating within a one mile radius. The last bricks were produced in Wrenshall in 1954.

Wrenshall Building Department

The City of Wrenshall requires building permits for all new construction, and remodeling of decks. This includes replacing windows. Applications can be picked up at the city office. The

Building Official will review the application and issue the necessary permit along with any additional instructions deemed appropriate. Please allow enough time for this since our Building Official is not onsite full time.

Parks

Hugh Line Park, otherwise known as the deer park, is located just as you come into Wrenshall from the north. There is a pavilion with picnic tables and a fire place along with a playground, tennis court and a volleyball court available for the publics use. A porta-potty is available from May to September.

Habhegger Park is located on Woodhaven. It separates Woodhaven North from Woodhaven South. There is only a swing set located at this park but room enough for little ones to play.

Sidewalk and Snow Removal

The city maintenance workers do try to keep the sidewalks cleaned, but resident who may live along the sidewalks are encouraged to help with this if they can. City streets are plowed by the county and may not be plowed right away after a snowfall.

Grass Mowing, Clippings and Brush

We have a city yard waste area available to all city residents for grass, leaves, twigs and brush only. It is located off of Pioneer on Industrial. We do ask that when you mow your lawn, don't throw the clippings on to the streets or sidewalks, as they clog up the storm sewer drains during rainfalls.

Dog/Cat Licensing

All residents who own a dog or cat are required to license them with the city. Licenses are free of charge and can be picked up at City Hall. Please keep your dog on a leash when in public.

Always remember to clean up after your dog.

Trails

The Alex Laveau Trail was named after a county commissioner and dairy farmer who was from Wrenshall and who was a strong advocate for rails-to-trails projects. The trail is located just off of Parkwood Dr. It is used for walking, hiking, biking, in-line skating, cross country skiing and snowmobiling. The paved surface ends at Hwy 23 but the trail continues to MN-WI state line north of CR 4. This is the same trail you can connect to by Delzotto Products just north of Wrenshall on CR 1. The trail continues into Carlton, where you can connect to the Willard-Munger Trail and go north/east to Duluth or south/west to Hinckley. What great nature and outdoor opportunities we have in our backyard.



Organic Farming

The Food Farm is a certified organic farm located in Wrenshall. The farm offers summer, winter, preserving, poultry and egg shares, enabling their members to receive fresh local food most of the year. Their weekly summer shares are delivered to 13 locations in Duluth, Superior, Cloquet, Esko, and Wrenshall. Some of the produce is also available at the Whole Foods Co-op, Duluth Grill and Chester Creek Cafe.

The farm is owned by Janaki Fisher-Merritt and Annie Dugan, and operated by Janaki, John and Jane Fisher-Merritt and Dave Hanlon. It is the Food Farms passion to provide high quality food for their CSA members. All of the vegetables are certified organic by MOSA, and grown without the use of chemical fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. Events

Brickyard Days – The first Saturday in August each year, is dedicated to “Brickyard Days” which is a community wide celebration. Some of the activities that take place are a 5K, vendors in the park, activities for kids in the park, music, a parade and live music in the evening at Bricks Pub and Grub. Watch for Brickyard Days meetings. They are always looking for volunteers.

City Clean-Up

The city and school work together on a clean-up day to help residents keep their yards looking nice. Maintenance staff and students will plan to help anyone who may need it. Leaves bagged up and at curbside in the morning of the advertised day, will be picked up. Remember that the yard waste should be free of other debris such as paper, glass, etc. They will also take a modest amount of twigs and branches

Free Range Film Festival

The Free Range Film Festival’s is in their eleventh year. Since 2004, their annual event has drawn thousands of film buffs and curiosity seekers, eager to watch independent cinema in a barn. The barn is located at the junctions of County Roads 1 and 4 just one mile south of Wrenshall. Selected films are shown in the massive hayloft. A 14’x24’ screen and surround sound round out your film-going experience. While there is officially no charge for admission,

the organizers do ask audience members for a \$10 donation to help pay for barn maintenance. Check their schedule and find more information on their website; www.freerangefilm.com

Wrenshall Volunteer Fire Department & First Responders

The Wrenshall Fire Department and First Responders proudly serve the City of Wrenshall, Holyoke, and several Townships in the surrounding area. The fire department and first responders are able to operate through the hard work and dedication of their volunteers. You can look them up on Facebook, Wrenshall Fire and Rescue. The department has a well maintained fleet of equipment consisting of a 3000 gallon tanker, 2 – 1250 gallons per minute pumper trucks, an ATV used for rescue and wild land fires, first responder & personnel carrier, and a wild land vehicle. The department responds to approximately 100 calls per year which includes both fire and medical.



Schools

Wrenshall is a public school open to Pre-K – 12. Our facility is located in Wrenshall on Pioneer Dr. We have a Latch Key and Early Childhood Family Education program for younger children. Latch Key is currently open during the summer months to accommodate the need from families in the area. A school and community newspaper “Images” is put out monthly except for July.
